**COURSE OVERVIEW**

The opening pages of this syllabus briefly address the basic course requirements for Legal Research and Writing II; the balance of the syllabus details the weekly sequence of readings, assignments, and classes for the semester. Please consult the Student Manual and its Code of Conduct, posted on the course TWEN site, for more detailed course requirements and information, including some added information for the assignments in the second semester of the course.

The policies for the course remain the same as they were in the fall. As a reminder, in the Student Manual you will find various materials relating to the requirements for the first two semesters of the course, including an overview of the goals and assignments, the attendance policy, the format and submission requirements for written graded assignments, the ethical and conduct requirements for the course, and an explanation of the grading for the course.

**Graded Assignments and Midterm<sup>2</sup>**

The graded assignments this semester are the Quick-Turn-Around Email Assignment (due on Monday, January 31), the Motion Memorandum (due on Friday, March 4), the Client Letter (due in mid/late March), the Contract Drafting Assignment and the Pleading Drafting Assignment (due in late March/early April), and the Motion Oral Argument (presented starting in mid-April). The materials in the Motion Memorandum assignment packet will form the basis for all of these assignments. The assignment packet will be distributed in your first class meeting of the semester, on Wednesday, January 19.

In addition, you will have a take-home midterm shortly after your return from Spring Break that will introduce you to one type of writing that is expected on the bar exam: the Multistate

Practice Test (MPT). For that midterm, you will write an objective memo in a limited period of time based only on materials you will receive in a packet. To prepare for this midterm, you should review feedback from me for the objective memos you wrote in the fall, but you will not need to know any law for the exam and no other preparation will be necessary.

### Tutorials

There will be one set of tutorials this semester, the Alpha (group research) and Beta (individual draft review) tutorials for the Motion Memorandum. Tutorial scheduling will again be done through the sign-up sheets on the TWEN site.

### Syllabus Pointers

As in the fall, our class is scheduled to meet for two hours per week in the Room 6. But the actual scheduling in any given week may vary due to other course activities, such as guest lectures or workshops, tutorials, and simulations. So please check the syllabus carefully each week and do not assume any particular meeting schedule or place.

Please note that the syllabus is intended to serve as a guide to the material to be discussed each week in class and I may modify it if necessary. If any syllabus changes come up, I will announce them as far in advance as possible.

**Writing assignments.** The major writing assignment of the semester – the Motion Memorandum (“Motion Memo”) – should be submitted to the Assignment Drop Box on the TWEN site by 11:00 a.m. on the due date of Friday, March 4, 2011. I will give you directions in class for the submission of other assignments.

During the semester, I may assign additional class exercises and ungraded writing assignments beyond the graded ones listed here.

**Reading assignments.** As in the fall, please do the required reading assignment before the class for which it is assigned. You may need to come back to early reading assignments over the course of the semester to get full benefit from the reading. You will be held responsible for information in the reading that we do not cover in class, including information on grammar, punctuation, and legal citation. Except in the ICW, where both reading and exercises are required, you need not complete exercises in the text unless I specifically assign them, but you may find it helpful to do so.

**Citation Exercise assignments.** As in the fall, for each citation exercise, you are required to read through the applicable chapter of the ICW, review the accompanying rules in the Bluebook, and then complete the online exercises. The online exercises can be found at <http://www.lexisnexis.com/icw/>. You will be required to complete TBA<sup>3</sup>

citation assignments. Generally, you have one week to complete ICW exercises, and they are due by class time on Monday, unless otherwise specified.

**Research Exercise assignments.** You will be required to complete TBA<sup>4</sup> research assignments. These assignments will be accessed online. Generally, you have one week to complete research exercises, and they are due by class time on Wednesday, unless otherwise specified.

### Professionalism, Classroom Environment, and Personal Technology Use

Failure to abide by this policy may result in the loss of the privilege to use the technology in question during the class where the violation occurred; repeated violations may result in additional sanctions, including point deductions, within my discretion.
